A BILL

To reauthorize the United States Anti-Doping Agency, and for other purposes. 3

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE. 4 This Act may be cited as the "United States Anti-5 Doping Agency Reauthorization Act of 2020". 6 SEC. 2. PROMOTION OF YOUTH SPORTS. 7 Section 701(b) of the Office of National Drug Control 8 Policy Reauthorization Act of 2006 (21 U.S.C. 2001(b)) is amended-9 10 (1) in paragraph (4), by striking the period at 11 the end and inserting "; and"; and 12 (2) by adding at the end the following: "(5) promote a positive youth sport experience 13 14 by using a portion of its funding to provide edu-15 cational materials on sportsmanship, character build-16 ing, and healthy performance for athletes, parents, 17 and coaches participating in youth sports.". 18 SEC. 3. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS. 19 Section 703 of the Office of National Drug Control Pol-20 icy Reauthorization Act of 2006 (21 U.S.C. 2003) is amend-21 ed to read as follows: 22 **"SEC. 703. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.** 23 "There are authorized to be appropriated to the United" 24 States Anti-Doping Agency— 25 "(1) for fiscal year 2021, \$15,500,000;

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1	"(2) for fiscal year 2022, \$16,200,000;
2	"(3) for fiscal year 2023, \$16,900,000;
3	"(4) for fiscal year 2024, \$17,700,000;
4	"(5) for fiscal year 2025, \$18,500,000;
5	"(6) for fiscal year 2026, \$21,900,000;
6	"(7) for fiscal year 2027, \$22,800,000;
7	"(8) for fiscal year 2028, \$24,900,000; and
8	"(9) for fiscal year 2029, \$23,700,000.".

9 SEC. 4. COORDINATION AND SHARING OF INFORMATION

WITH USADA.

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11 (a) INFORMATION SHARING.—Except as otherwise pro-12 hibited by law and except in cases in which the integrity of a criminal investigation would be affected, in furtherance 13 of the obligation of the United States under Article 7 of 14 15 the Convention, the Attorney General, the Secretary of Homeland Security, and the Commissioner of Food and 16 Drugs shall coordinate with the United States Anti-Doping 17 18 Agency with regard to any effort to prevent the use of performance-enhancing drugs or prohibit performance-enhanc-19 20 ing methods by sharing with the United States Anti-Doping 21 Agency all information which may be relevant to pre-22 venting the use of such performance-enhancing drugs or 23 prohibiting such performance-enhancing methods.

24 (b) CONVENTION DEFINED.—In this section, the term "Convention" means the United Nations Educational, Sci-25

- 3 2005, and ratified by the United States in 2008.
